Alumni Association president and CEO Archie Griffin landed at No. 4 on the Big Ten Network's countdown of the top-50Big Ten Icons. Griffin will be featured in a half-hour program on the Big Ten Network this Sunday, Feb. 13 at 9 p.m. ET. Griffin is the fifth Buckeye in the top-50 and the second in the top eight. Other Ohio State Icons who were previously revealed include Jerry Lucas (No. 8), Jack Nicklaus (No. 18), Hopalong Cassady (No. 39), and Chris Spielman (No. 47).

CHICAGO Ohio State's Archie Griffin has been named Big Ten Icon No. 4. Presented by Discover and hosted by Keith Jackson, Big Ten Icons continues at 9 PM ET on Sunday with a profile of college football's only two-time Heisman Trophy

The episode includes new one-on-one interviews with Griffin, teammates Ray Griffin, Jeff Logan and John Hicks, fellow Buckeye Heisman Trophy winner Eddie George and others.

Legendary Ohio State coach Woody Hayes once said about Griffin, "He's a better young man than he is he is a football player, and he's the best football player I've ever seen."

In the episode, Michigan broadcaster Jim Brandstatter says, "Everybody knew he was going to get the ball 20-25 times a game, and they still couldn't stop him. And, to me, that's what Archie Griffin brought to the table -- the ability to make a play where there wasn't a play.'

Griffin, who was born at Ohio State UniversityHospital and grew up in Columbus, was awarded the Heisman Trophy in 1974 and 1975. He was a three-time All-American, remains the Buckeyes' all-time leading rusher and was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1986. Griffin's No. 45 has been retired by Ohio State.

Griffin helped the Buckeyes win four Big Ten titles from 1972-75 and was the starting tailback in four straight Rose Bowl games. Ohio State posted a 40-5-1 record during his four years, and Griffin rushed for 100 yards or more in 31 straight games.

The NCAA honored Griffin in 1975 with "Top Five" award for academic. athletic and leadership achievements.



Graduate **Student:** Hillary LeBail



I am very excited to share that this summer I will be completing an internship at the Alaska SeaLife Center (ASLC), a non-profit organization located in Seward, Alaska. For over ten years, the ASLC has served as the state's only public aquarium and ocean wildlife rescue center. The mission of the ASLC is to generate and share scientific knowledge to promote understanding and stewardship of Alaska's marine ecosystems. Internships at the ASLC are very prestigious and I am proud to have been selected out of more than 300 applicants from around the world. My role at this organization will be to research the impacts of climate change on marine ecosystems, help the organization identify ways they can become involved in climate change research and education, and develop educational programs on climate change that can be incorporated into public aquarium exhibits. In addition, I will be working in conjunction with the National Park Service to identify values people associate with wildlife in the Alaska region. I will live in Seward for approximately three months, but most of my research will take place throughout Alaska and I will report directly to the CEO. While I will have many responsibilities to fulfill, I also look forward to some of the other opportunities that will be available to me including work in marine mammal rehabilitation such as nursing sea otter pups or taking part in rescue missions in the field. I believe this experience is going to be truly amazing and I am so thankful that my education at Ohio State has opened the door to such an incredible opportunity.
